knee injury last spring, was easily the biggest surprise of the Rocket camp. What is more junior Dick Eberlin also is in the picture, and he looks good enough to be playing a lot of football for most teams.

TAILBACKS—Senior Tony Harris (889 yards, 5.8 avg., 8 TDs) and junior John Downey, who ran 1-2 at this position last year, are both back, and behind them is another of spring football's surprises, soph Paul Highnam.

FLANKER BACKS—Sophomore Glyn Smith looked like a carbon copy of 1969 standout Dan Crockett at times last spring, and the Rockets have two other excellent prospects at this position. One, soph Mike Hurt, will give Smith the most pressure for playing time. The other, Mike Kochkowsky, may be a year away from helping much but has good promise.

DEFENSIVE ENDS—Junior Ron Roberts saw lots of action on both sides of the line last year behind Jim Tyler and Ed Davis and will start fall practice at right end. Behind him are two sophomores, Ron Davis and Bruce Roberts. Another soph, Steve Donahue, was one of spring football's biggest surprises and will get the No. 1 call at left end when practice begins. But right behind him is letterman Leon Campbell and a fine sophomore prospect, Jim Wells.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES—Starters Mel Long and Don Hotz return for another season and, if anything, their replacements look stronger than a year ago. One is soph Willie Duke, the other soph Gary Kupec. Both are stronger and quicker than Toledo's reserve tackles last season.

LINEBACKERS—Charlie Burgbacher has been a starter for two seasons and calls defensive signals. John Niezgoda had an even flashier season last year than did Burgbacher, and behind them are junior Bob Rose and senior Tony Baltes, both excellent football players in their own right. Two more sophs, Steve Ward and Tim Kubiak, also show fine potential.

MIDDLE GUARDS—Steve Schnitkey alternated with Jim Manuel last year, logging almost as much playing time and showing ability that compares him with ex-Rocket great Tom Beutler. His replacement, soph Darrel Reasonover, is small but lightning fast. Behind them is junior Rich Pivoriunas.

CORNER BACKS—John Saunders, who started every game as a sophomore strong safety in 1970, has been moved to the left corner spot played last year by all-America Curt Johnson. He is backed up by Dale

Knepper and soph Jim Crossgrove. The right corner position will go to junior Steve Banks, who came on strong in the latter half of the 1969 campaign and is one of the fastest men, along with Saunders, on the Rocket squad. Behind him is senior letterman Bob Flynn.

SAFETIES—Co-captain Tom Duncan, starter for two seasons, has moved from the right corner position to strong safety to take advantage of his excellent tackling ability. He has another hard "hitter" behind him, junior letterman Howard Pernel, and behind them is a fine-looking soph, Bob Stroman. Junior Gary Hinkson, one of the major reasons Toledo jelled into a big winner last year, is back along with senior letterman Randy Pape and a soph, Mike Jones.

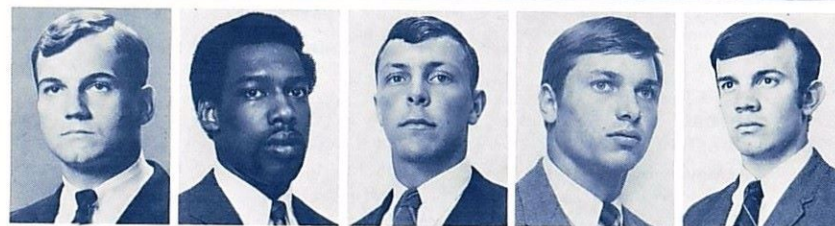

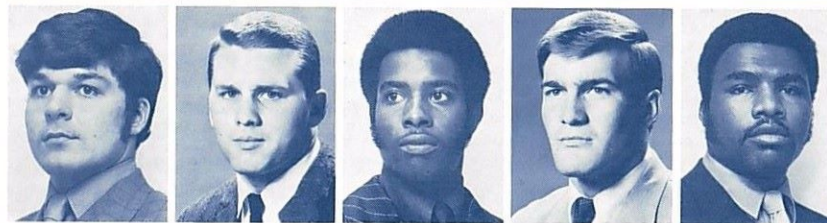

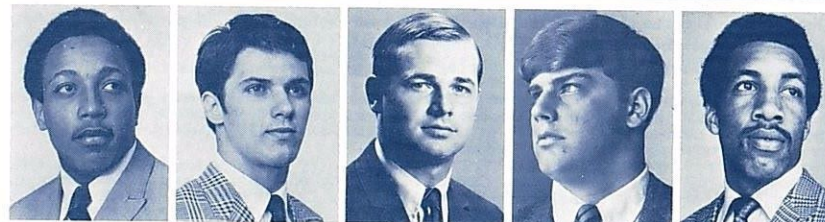
FAIR, DON, open end, 20, 6-0, 165, junior, Canton (Lehman).

Fifty-seven times last season Ealey either passed or ran for first downs on crucial third and fourth down situations. Eight of the plays resulted in long gains for touchdowns. Chuck's intelligence enabled Rocket coaches to entrust him with the majority of play-calling even though he was only a sophomore. Most of Ealey's clutch plays for first downs and touchdowns came when he called "automatics" at the line of scrimmage after noting defensive adjustments made by opponents. If he enjoys another season like 1969 and leads Toledo to another MAC championship, Ealey may be in line for more all-America mention as a junior. He certainly will have few QB peers anywhere in the nation by the time he is a senior.

Ken scored 67 per cent efficiency in blocking on 681 plays last season and threw 10 cross-field blocks leading to big gains. Twice he was credited with two blocks on the same play.

ROCKETS IN PRESS—RADIO—TV

One of coach Frank Lauterbur's regular recruiting advantages is the large metropolitan news media coverage afforded Rocket players. Besides benefitting from direct coverage by the largest daily newspaper of any city in the Mid-American Conference (THE TOLEDO BLADE, daily circulation 174,612, Sunday circulation 196,208, and THE TOLEDO TIMES, daily circulation 31,347), the Rockets also enjoy the biggest radio-TV audience.

Covering the Rockets on a regular basis is one of the Blade's sports columnists, Jim Taylor, whose coverage of major league baseball, pro football, and other major sports events coast-to-coast has made him one of the foremost writers in the nation.

The Rockets' official radio station for the third consecutive season will be the most powerful radio voice in the city, WSPD (Storer Broadcasting Corp.), which broadcasts with a power of 5,000 watts, is on

the air 24 hours a day, and numbers a potential regular listening audience of over 280,000 persons in 22 counties of Northwestern Ohio and Southeastern Michigan. Furthermore, its broadcasts reach as far north as the upper peninsula of Michigan, as far east as Pittsburgh, as far south as Virginia, and as far west as the Ohio-Indiana line, depending upon atmospheric conditions.

Jerry Keil, sports director of WSPD radio, will again provide the play-by-play description of Rocket games. Color commentary will be by Lee Pete, Rocket quarterback of the mid-40s who still holds some UT passing records and who has coached the Alumni team in the annual Varsity-Alumni Oldtimers game for the past five years.

Toledo players also have the benefit of game coverage by three commercial television stations who film action for regular sports programming. They are WTOL-TV (Orris Tabner, sports director), WSPD-TV (Frank Gilhooley, sports director), and WDHO-TV.

The Head Coach and Athletic Director

FRANK X. LAUTERBUR

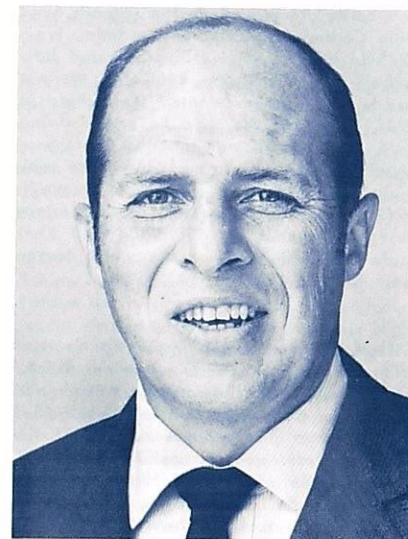
Frank X. Lauterbur, 43, begins the 1970 season as the reigning "Mid-American Conference Coach-of-the-Year" and as "Ohio College Coach-of-the-Year," honors accorded him after last season's perfect 11-0 record. It is the second time in three years that Lauterbur has carried both titles.

With seven seasons already behind him at Toledo, Lauterbur already has held the head football coaching position longer than any previous Rocket coach since the sport began at the University in 1917, and last year's Toledo team achieved greatness matched by no other Rocket team in history. Lauterbur also became the first Mid-American Conference coach ever to win 11 football games in one season, and Toledo's 20th place ranking nationally was one of the highest levels ever by an MAC team.

Lauterbur was named head football coach at The University of Toledo on April 2, 1963, succeeding Clive H. Rush, who had resigned suddenly March 22. Slightly more than two months later, June 10 to be exact, Lauterbur's all around qualities had so impressed the Athletic Board of Control, that the group named him as Director of Intercollegiate Athletics. Lauterbur's wide contacts in both the college and professional sports world, and his warm personality and down-to-earth personal approach to everyone have made him a natural for the position. His close interest in the high school coaching fraternity and his willingness to crowd as many public appearances as possible into his busy schedule has made him doubly popular as a coach.

Lauterbur's biggest accomplishment, however, has been the upgrading of the entire athletic picture at Toledo. Besides building the football program up to MAC championship level, Lauterbur has insisted on excellence from his other sport coaches and has gotten results. Titles in basketball, tennis, golf, and wrestling have come to Toledo during Lauterbur's tenure as athletic director.

As the athletic director, Lauterbur consistently has encouraged multiple sports participation by Toledo athletes as a means of upgrading the entire program. His own football players have made important con-

tributions to the other sports. Former all-MAC footballers Mel Miller, Mel Tucker, and Paul Elzey also won MAC honors in other sports, and one member of last fall's MAC championship football team, tailback Tony Harris was a member of the 1970 track team.

Lauterbur's career is an impressive one. His last assignment prior to coming to Toledo was at the University of Pittsburgh as defensive line coach and co-ordinator of defenses under Coach John Micheloson. Prior to that assignment he had served as defensive line coach under Colonel Earl Blaik and Dale Hall at Army (1957-62), as defensive line coach and tackle coach under Weeb Ewbank for the Baltimore Colts (1955-56), and as line coach under Trevor Rees at Kent State University (1953-55). He also had high school experience, beginning his career at Wickliffe, O., High School in 1949 and continuing at Cleveland Collinwood High from 1950-52. In three seasons at the Cleveland school his teams won 19 of 28 games, took the East Senate League championship, and rose to fifth in statewide polls—the highest ranking a Cleveland prep team had attained up to that time.

Lauterbur was born in Cincinnati, Ohio, August 8, 1925, spent most of his youth

in Sidney, Ohio, and graduated from the University of Detroit High School in 1943. He first attended Oberlin College from 1943-44 as part of the Marine Corps V-12 Program. (Lauterbur was a U. S. Marine Corps 2nd Lt. during World War II). While at Oberlin, he played on the school's 1943 Ohio Conference championship team. From 1945-46 he played both football and basketball with the Camp Pendleton Marines and was on an undefeated team there in 1945. Following the war, he attended Mt. Union College and won all-Ohio Conference honors as a guard from 1946-48. He took a bachelor's degree from Mt. Union in 1949, did graduate work at both Western Reserve University in Cleveland and Kent State University and won a master's degree from Kent in 1955.

Lauterbur was widely known for football clinic appearances and magazine articles on football before he came to Toledo, and during the past seven years he has added still more to that reputation. One of the featured lecturers on the August, 1970, clinic program of the Ohio High School All-Star Game at Canton, Ohio, he also has spoken on football at the NCAA Convention, the famed Kutcher's Clinic at Monticello, N. Y., the Kodak All-America Clinic at Cincinnati, at various clinics in Pennsylvania, Delaware and New Jersey, and at numerous universities.

Among his magazine articles are "Pre-Season and In-Season Weight Assistance Exercise Program" for the American Football Coaches Association Manual and "How to Watch a Football Game" in conjunction with Merv Hyman in SPORTS ILLUSTRATED.

Lauterbur's specialty remains defense. His reputation as an expert in that phase of the game preceded him to Toledo, and his Rocket defenses have finished in the top 10 of national defense during the 1965-66-67 and 1969 seasons. His 1967 defense finished third nationally in total defense, and last fall Toledo led the country's major colleges in defensive statistics for the first time in history.

Lauterbur stands six feet tall, weighs 190 pounds. He and his wife, Mary, are the parents of four children. There are three girls, Mary Lynn, a 20-year old junior at Toledo this fall; Frances, age 19; and Carol, age 15; and a son, Frank, Jr., age 7.

The Assistant Athletic Director

CHARLES C. SNYDER

When Vernon M. Smith resigned two years ago as assistant athletic director to accept a position as welfare director of the City of Toledo, Frank X. Lauterbur turned to one of his former coaching rivals to fill the vacancy, and the appointment was applauded by everyone familiar with the Mid-American Conference.

Lauterbur named Charles C. (Charlie) Snyder, 48, as Smith's replacement. Snyder was serving as dean of student affairs at Marshall University at the time of his appointment, but he is best remembered in MAC circles as head football coach of Marshall's Thundering Herd during the best football years the school has enjoyed during the current decade.

Snyder became Marshall's head coach in January of 1959 and served in that capacity until the end of the 1967 season. His 1963 and 1964 Herd teams gave the school the first and only winning years Marshall has known in almost two decades. The best season was 1964 when Marshall finished 7-3 and tied for second place in the Mid-American Conference.

Snyder-coached Marshall teams were known for their rugged, aggressive, yet cleanly-played brand of football, and few if any coaches were more successful in getting the very most out of the playing talent on hand.

Snyder is a native of Kentucky. He was born at Catlettsburg, educated at Marshall, coached and taught at Catlettsburg High School, and coached and taught at Lafayette High School in Lexington, Ky., and in 1958 began his college coaching career as an assistant coach at the University of Kentucky under Blanton Collier, now the head coach of the Cleveland Browns.

Snyder took his B.A. degree from Marshall in 1948 and the M.A. degree from the same institution in 1967.

He was a football star himself in college. He played tackle on Marshall's 1947 Tangerine Bowl team, one of the finest teams in the school's history, and captained the squad.

Snyder served in the U. S. Navy as an athletic instructor for three years during World War II. He is married to the former Betty Jo Jordan of Huntington, W. Va., and they are the parents of a son, Wally, now a student at the University of Toledo.

Besides his duties as assistant athletic director, Snyder coaches the wide receivers on the football squad, and last season he produced two outstanding pass catchers, senior Dan Crockett and sophomore Don Fair. Crockett's improvement from the start of the season to the end of the year when he won honors in the Tangerine Bowl game so impressed pro scouts that he was an NFL draft selection by the San Francisco 49ers. Fair shows promise of being one of the best pass catchers in Toledo history.

Assistant Coaches

DAVE HARDY

Beginning his seventh season as a member of Lauterbur's staff is 47-year old Dave Hardy, one of the truly outstanding teachers of offensive line blocking in college football today. Finally given the kind of blockers needed in the Mid-American Conference, Hardy has for the past three seasons shown Toledoans some of the finest interior line play ever seen in the Glass Bowl. In both 1967 and 1969 his linemen were an important part in a Toledo offense that ranked among national leaders in almost every statistical category.

Hardy is especially adept at coaching the interior line, particularly guards who

must pull for wide blocking. Toledo has produced three first team all-MAC offensive guards since Hardy took over coaching the position (Steve Erickson in 1965, John Brown in 1967, and Mel Miller in 1968). Senior Bob Caverly will be a strong candidate for all-MAC honors this season.

As a collegian he played halfback before World War II under Dr. Clarence (Doc) Spears at The University of Toledo, and following the war he played under Bill Orwig in the last winning seasons Rocket teams knew before 1967. As a coach at Toledo DeVilbiss High School he helped turn out eight City League champions in 16 seasons.

Hardy took his bachelor's degree from Toledo in 1948 and a master's degree from Purdue University in 1951. His coaching career was spent entirely at DeVilbiss High, the first ten as an assistant and the last six as head coach. DeVilbiss won five City League titles during Hardy's assistant tenure and three more during the time he was head man. Numerous Hardy players have gone on to college stardom. His reputation as a specialist in line play, especially the trap game, was statewide and when he left DeVilbiss he was serving as district representative of the Ohio High School Coaches Association.

Hardy is married and with wife, Edna, is the father of three children—Karen, 18; David, 15; and Thomas, 12.

SIL CORNACHIONE

Sil Cornachione, 42-year-old former John Carroll University football star and later a successful football and basketball coach at his alma mater, is in his fourth season as offensive backfield coach. In two of his three years in the position Toledo has ranked among the nation's top 20 teams in total offense, rushing offense, passing offense, and scoring.

Subtle variations in the Rocket offense which Cornachione helped install when he came to Toledo turned quarterback John Schneider into one of the nation's top passers and total offense leaders and into a draft selection by both NFL and AFL teams. Then last season Cornachione helped develop Chuck Ealey into the first sophomore ever to win "Back-of-the-Year" honors in the Mid-American Conference, as well as one of the national statistical leaders in total offense. Another offensive star who matured into greatness under Cornachione was tailback Roland Moss, high among na-

tional career rushing leaders and last season a member of the Baltimore Colts in the NFL.

Cornachione was an all-city back during high school days at Cleveland Collinwood, then lettered three years on some of John Carroll's best football squads. He graduated in 1951 and began coaching at Cleveland Benedictine, serving as an assistant coach with teams that won 16 of 18 games, a City League title, and fourth place in statewide polls.

In 1953 Cornachione returned to John Carroll as backfield coach and in five years helped the Blue Streaks compile a record of 27-11-1. Cornachione also began a successful basketball coaching career at John Carroll. He was named head coach in that sport in 1954 and never experienced a losing season. His 1955-56 and 1956-57 teams won invitations to the NCAA college tournaments, and his 1957-58 and 1958-59 teams won Presidents Athletic Conference championships.

Cornachione returned to high school coaching in 1959 at Cleveland Heights and coached both football and basketball over the next four years. He holds both bachelor's and master's degrees, is married, and with wife, Shirley, has four sons — Craig, 18, a member of the Rocket freshman football team; Michael, 17; Thomas, 12; and David, 6.

JIM FLYNN

In his second season as defensive backfield coach, but in his seventh year on the staff of Frank Lauterbur, is 29-year old Jim Flynn, oldest member of a football family well-known in Toledo high school circles and a family that has had representation on the Rocket varsity squad for eight consecutive seasons.

Flynn's first year as defensive backfield coach produced Toledo's first recognized major college all-America player, corner back Curtis Johnson, the fourth round draft selection of the Miami Dolphins.

Flynn himself was a former star at Kent State University. His brother Bill lettered three seasons as a Toledo varsity back, and his brother John, won his third letter and first team all-MAC honors as a Rocket defensive back in 1967. His youngest brother, Bob, has lettered as a defensive back the last two years and will be a senior corner back this season.

Flynn is a 1959 graduate of Central Catholic High School where he won all-City League honors under coach Tom McHugh. At Kent State he won all-Mid-American Conference selection as a quarterback. He took his degree in education with a major in chemistry from Kent State in 1964 and during the 1963 football season served as an assistant and scout on the staff of former Kent coach Trevor Rees.

Flynn met his wife, Cathy, when she was one of several nurses attending him in an Ann Arbor (Mich.) hospital while Jim was recovering from a near-fatal auto crash. The couple are the parents of a son, James Francis, III, age 21 months.

DON LEWIS

Donald Lewis, 35-year-old former head football and basketball coach at Toledo Central Catholic High School, is starting his third season as coach of the Rockets' defensive middle guards and linebackers.

Two of Lewis' outstanding products last season were senior middle guard Jim Manuel, seventh round draft choice of the NFL St. Louis Cardinals, and sophomore linebacker John Niezgodka, named UPI "Midwest Lineman-of-the-Week" after the Ohio game, a first team all-MAC pick, and an honorable mention all-American.

Like Dave Hardy and Dick Strahm, Lewis is a University of Toledo graduate and a Varsity 'T' letter winner. He graduated from UT in 1960 with a bachelor's degree in education. He also holds a master of arts degree from Mary Manse College in Toledo.

Lewis is a lifelong Toledoan. He graduated from Woodward High School, and all eight years of his high school coaching career were spent at Central Catholic. He was backfield coach on the school's 1962 Ohio high school championship team and later was head coach of both football and basketball. He also coached golf at Central.

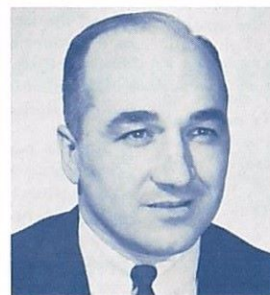
Lewis and his wife, Sharon, are the parents of three children—Patty Ann, 7; Terry, 5; and Kathy, 3.

DICK STRAHM

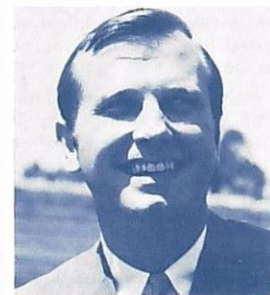
Stepping into the tough job of replacing Jack Murphy as coordinator of the nation's defending total defense champion is 36-year old Dick Strahm, for the past three seasons one of the winningest high school coaches in Ohio.

Strahm, a University of Toledo graduate (1958), returned to his alma mater after leading Warren Western Reserve High School to three consecutive 9-1 seasons and No. 5 ranking among Ohio's Class AA schools each of the last two years in both AP and UPI polls. His 1969 Warren team shut out seven opponents, limiting them to 32 total points, and in 1968 his team blanked six opponents, indicating the reason he was chosen to replace Murphy as a defensive specialist.

Strahm has a strong Toledo and Northwestern Ohio background. He graduated from Toledo Libbey High School and started his coaching career there as an assistant. After two years in the Air Force, Strahm became head football coach at nearby Lakota where he began a football program from nothing. From there he went to Bryan as head coach and in four years compiled a 28-8 record.

His success at Bryan gave Strahm an opportunity at Warren Western Reserve, a new high school at which Strahm began the football program only four years ago. He was 5-5 the first season and then 27-3 the last three years, bringing his overall head coaching record to 69-18-1.

More than a dozen Strahm-coached players hold college football grants-in-aid, including Rocket star Gary Hinkson. His other graduates are playing at Ohio State, Michigan, Ohio University, Bowling Green, Harvard, Wittenberg and Heidelberg.

Strahm is married to the former Ginger Farquharson of Toledo suburb Perrysburg. The couple have two children, Doug, age 5, and Gina, age 2.

ELROY MORAND

Most recent addition to the Toledo staff is Elroy Morand, 26-year-old former Florida A&M star who replaced Don Baker as head freshman football coach.

Morand came to Toledo from Delaware State College at Dover, Del., where he was offensive backfield coach and offensive coordinator last season.

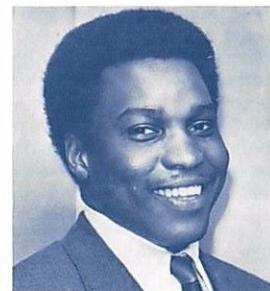
The new Rocket freshman coach is one of the brightest of dozens of football stars turned out by the famed Jake Gaither at Florida A&M. During four seasons as quarterback at the Tallahassee, Fla., school, Morand was all-league three times (Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference),

guided A&M to 35 wins in 40 games, and was in the same backfield with the world's fastest human, Bob Hayes, now of the Dallas Cowboys.

Morand played in exhibition games in 1968 with the Kansas City Chiefs and then entered the coaching profession as an assistant at Warren Western Reserve with Dick Strahm. From Warren he went to Delaware State where he worked under head coach Arnold Jeter.

Morand originally is from Ocala, Fla. He is unmarried.

PUBLIC RELATIONS DIRECTOR (SPORTS)

MAX E. GERBER

Max E. Gerber, 41, assistant director of public relations, assigned to athletics, came to The University of Toledo in August, 1960, after seven years in public education and three in journalism. He taught English, history, political science and journalism at Linden McKinley High School in Columbus and joined the editorial staff of the OHIO STATE JOURNAL after several years of free lance writing for the COLUMBUS DISPATCH, COLUMBUS CITIZEN, and the CHICAGO TRIBUNE.

Gerber is a native of Jackson Center, Ohio. He holds a bachelor of arts degree from Capital University (1950), a master of arts degree from Ohio State University (1960), and is a student in the doctoral program in history at The University of Toledo.

Gerber's background also includes published by-line articles in SPORT Magazine, BASEBALL DIGEST, BUCKEYE FOOTBALL, BUCKEYE BASKETBALL, and BETTER CAMPING Magazine. His 1968 ROCKET FOOTBALL MAGAZINE won second place nationally for editorial excellence among colleges and universities publishing up to 20,000 football programs per season.

For the past seven years, Gerber has served on the "Scholar-Athlete Award" Committee of the Toledo Chapter, National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame. He is a member of the College Sports Information Directors of America, the Mid-American Conference News Media Association, and the American College Public Relations Association.

Gerber is married. He and wife Rosemary have a son, Richard, age 14.

DAVID STAHL

David L. Stahl, 22, is starting his second

year as sports public relations assistant. He joined the staff last year after several years as a student assistant. Much of the statistical data compiled for Rocket football and basketball history was done by Stahl during his student years in the office.

Stahl is a graduate of Toledo Start High School and will complete studies this season in the College of Arts and Sciences with a bachelor of arts degree.

THE TRAINERS

JIM NICE

Starting his 10th season as trainer of the Rockets is one of the nation's best known physical therapists, 40-year-old Jim Nice, native of Lima, Ohio.

Besides his own outstanding credentials as an athletic trainer, Nice has acquired the help of one of the finest teams of medical specialists associated with any college in the country. They are orthopedic specialist Dr. Ned Hein, surgeon Dr. Roland Gandy, and general practitioner and surgeon Dr. Bill Henry.

Nice is married. He and his wife, Pat, are the parents of two children—Nancy, age 12, and Jimmy, age 10.

BILL JONES

William D. Jones, 27, is in his first season as assistant athletic trainer, having come to Toledo from Findlay High School where he was an assistant football coach and head trainer.

Jones holds both bachelors and masters degrees from Bowling Green State University. His experience as a trainer includes four years as an undergraduate assistant at Bowling Green and three years as an assistant football coach and trainer at Vermilion High School.

Jones is a native of South Amherst and is married to a Bowling Green graduate. He and wife Barbara are the parents of one child, a girl, Cindy, age 1.

Reviewing The 1969 Season

TOLEDO'S GREATEST YEAR

By any standards the 1969 season was the greatest football year ever at Toledo since the sport began at the University in 1917. As a memento of Toledo's greatest season ever, this special section of the Rocket Football Dope Book covers the many achievements of the 1969 Rockets and presents a capsule summary of Toledo's 11 consecutive victories.

The major achievements of the Rockets as a team were these:

- the first unbeaten, untied season in Toledo history and the first 11-0 season in the history of the Mid-American Conference;
- the first undisputed MAC football title in Toledo history, its second crown in three years, and the Tangerine Bowl championship;
- ranking as the nation's 20th best college football team by the Associated Press and by Football News;
- ranking as the nation's No. 1 team in total defense and ranking among the top 20 teams in rushing defense, defense against scoring, rushing offense, and scoring;
- one all-America player, five honorable mention all-Americans, and eight first team all-Mid-American Conference selections;
- three professional football draftees and two pro free agent signees.

Honors won by individual Toledo players were as follows:

- defensive back Curtis Johnson became Toledo's first recognized all-America by being named first team all-America by NEA, second team by Associated Press, and third team by Central Press, plus being named first team all-MAC and being drafted fourth (highest ever for a Toledo player) by the Miami Dolphins;
- quarterback Chuck Ealey, a first team all-MAC and honorable mention all-America, became the first sophomore in history to be named "MAC Back-of-the-Year" after leading the league in

total offense and was named "Most Outstanding Back" in the Tangerine Bowl game;

- place kicker Ken Crots set a new NCAA record for consecutive points after touchdown in a career (77 in a row), finished his career as the fourth highest kick-scorer in 101 years of college football, won first team all-MAC and honorable mention all-America selection, played in the Hula Bowl Game at Honolulu, Hawaii, and signed a pro contract with the Pittsburgh Steelers;
- defensive end Jim Tyler won first team all-MAC and honorable mention all-America selection and signed a pro contract with the Buffalo Bills;
- linebacker John Niezgodka won first team all-MAC and honorable mention all-America honors as a sophomore and was named UPI "Midwest Lineman of the Week" after the Ohio University game;
- defensive tackle Mel Long won first team all-MAC and honorable mention all-America selection as a sophomore;
- tailback Tony Harris won first team all-MAC and honorable mention all-America selection as a junior and led the MAC in rushing;
- slot back Dan Crockett, who set new school records for kickoff and punt returns was named "Most Valuable Lineman" in the Tangerine Bowl game and was drafted by the San Francisco 49ers;
- offensive tackle Jim Rance won first team all-MAC selection;
- middle guard Jim Manuel was drafted seventh by the St. Louis Cardinals.

And finally, head coach Frank Lauterbur was honored for the second time in three seasons as "Mid-American Conference Coach of the Year" by the MAC News Media Association and as "Ohio College Coach of the Year" in a poll of more than 40 of the state's college coaches conducted by the Columbus Dispatch.

The Season In Review

TOLEDO 45, VILLANOVA 18

The Rockets opened the season with a 45-18 drubbing of a good Villanova team (the Wildcats went on to lose only two other games), and the manner in which Toledo won was indicative of the way the Rockets were to strike nearly every succeeding opponent.

The long scoring play was to be a trademark of the '69 Rockets, and that pattern evidenced itself quickly as tailback Tony Harris stunned Villanova with touchdown runs of 75, 67, and 15 yards. For the game, his first collegiate start, Harris netted 217 yards on 17 carries.

A record Glass Bowl crowd of 19,223 was on hand to see the budding Rocket stars do battle with defending MAC champion of two years, Ohio University.

Toledo's defense twice stopped Ohio drives inside the Rocket 10-yard line in the first quarter, forcing the Bobcats to settle for a 24-yard field goal by Jim Kensinger, and then the dam broke on Ohio.

Two plays after the OU field goal, QB Chuck Ealey found TE Al Baker with a pass along the sidelines after scrambling on a broken play, and Baker sped 66 yards for a score. The same combination, Ealey to Baker, clicked on a 62-yard pass play early in the second quarter and Toledo had a 14-3 lead.

The Rocket margin of safety jumped to 20-3 by halftime, Toledo moving 46-yards after defensive CB Curtis Johnson intercepted a Bryant pass at the Ohio 46. A 40-yard pass from Ealey to OE Don Fair

was the big gainer, and FB Seymour ran one yard for the score.

TOLEDO 27, B. G. 26

Many veteran MAC observers called this the greatest game ever played in the league. No one would dispute that it was the most thrilling.

After a sparring first period, Toledo jumped on the Falcons for 17 points in the second quarter.

By halftime the Rockets enjoyed a statistical superiority of 226 yards to only 63 for Bowling Green.

The second half was another story, almost another game. Bowling Green drove 61 yards for a touchdown the second time it got the football, but the Falcons missed on a conversion run for two points. BG took advantage of a series of big breaks when a Toledo punt was blocked at the Rocket 20 yard line. The Falcons scored in seven plays, but a conversion run failed again and Toledo led, 17-12.

A Falcon punt to Toledo's six-yard line set up BG's next opportunity. Punting into a 22-mph wind, Rocket Jeff Siek kicked only 12 yards to the Toledo 20 and in four plays the Falcons had scored again. This time BG succeeded on a conversion run, and the Falcons led, 20-17.

Back came the Rockets. With Ealey completing three passes, Toledo drove 71 yards to score on a two-yard plunge by FB Seymour. Crots' kick provided a 24-20 lead for the Rockets as only 4:32 showed on the scoreboard clock.

Another Falcon punt, with the gale-force wind sending it 51 yards, put Toledo in a hole at its own 8-yard line. The Rockets could not work out and a succeeding Toledo punt set BG up in business at the Rocket 30. Aided by a pass interference call at the Toledo 8, the Falcons moved to a score in only three plays. This time an extra point kick was wide, and BG led 26-24 with only 49 seconds left.

Working the sideline passes like a pro, QB Ealey guided Toledo from its own 32-yard line after the kickoff to the Bowling Green 21 where OE Fair caught a seven-yard pass. Only two seconds remained on the clock as Crots toed a 37-yard field goal attempt directly into the wind. It fell just across the center goal post bar, and Toledo had an unbelievable 27-26 victory.

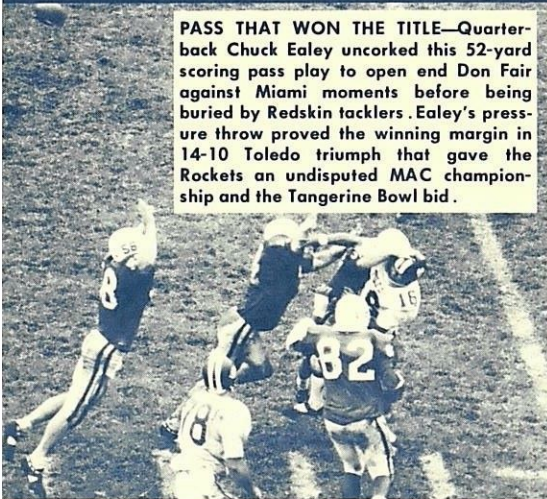

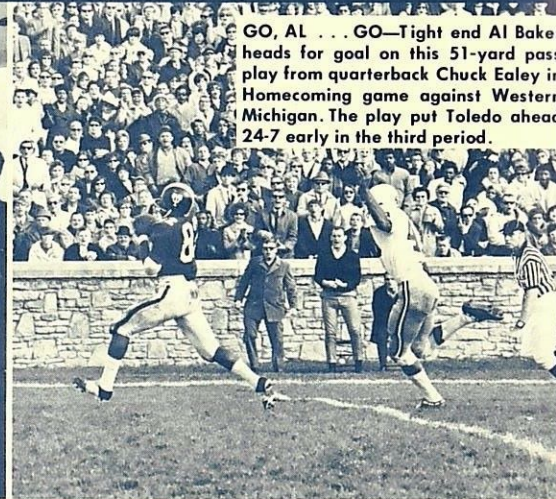

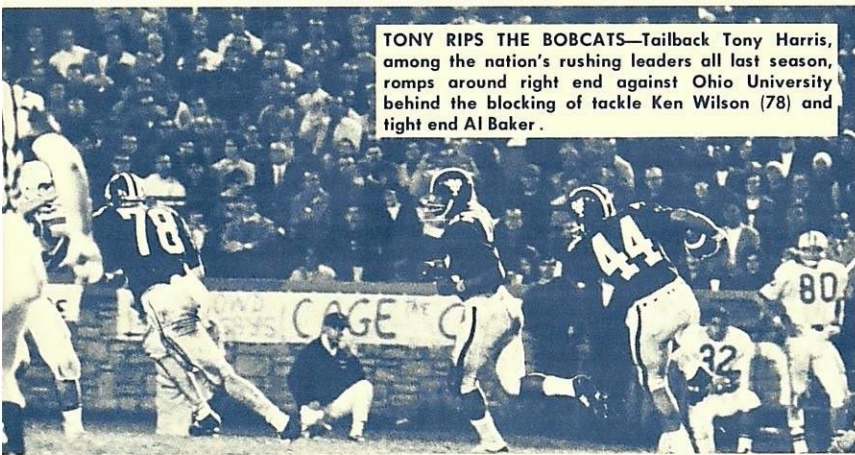

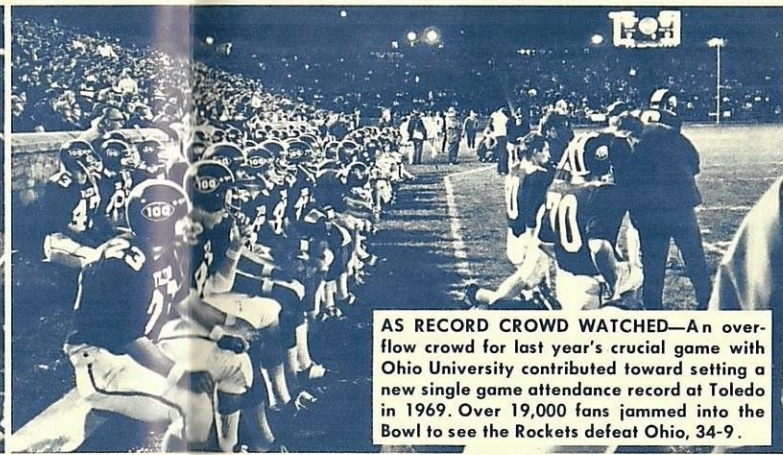

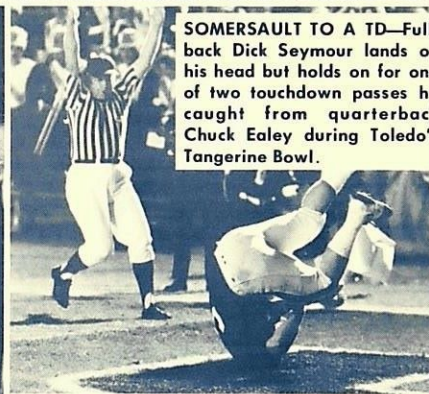

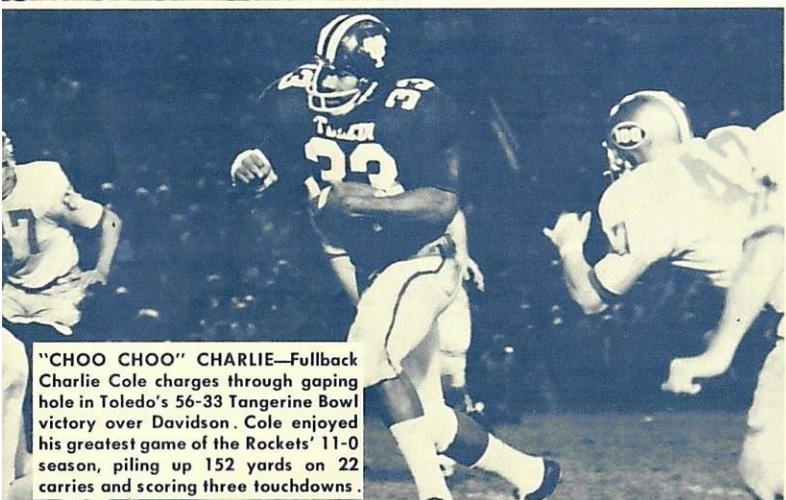

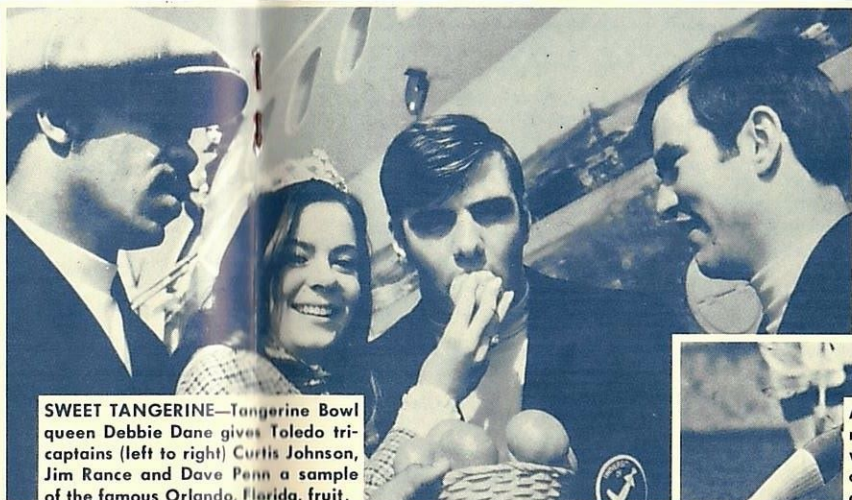

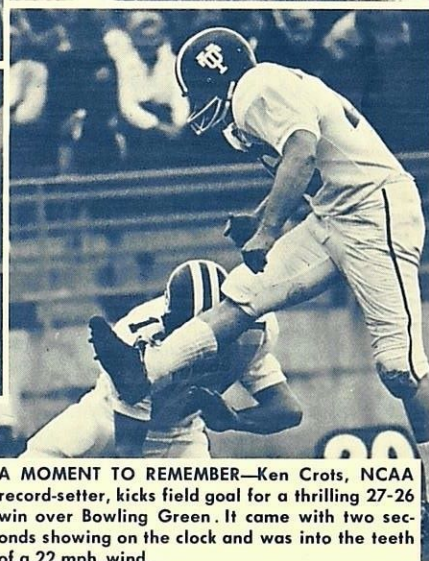

Toledo ran up the highest point total in the 24-year history of the Tangerine Bowl game, played before a record crowd of almost 17,000 at Orlando, Fla. The Rockets crushed Southern Conference champion Davidson, 56-33, in a game that was decided by halftime when Toledo held an insurmountable 42-7 lead.

The Rockets scored on the second scrimmage play when QB Chuck Ealey ran 52 yards on a keeper play. Davidson tied the game 7-7, and after that it was all Toledo. Ealey led the Rockets on a 95-yard drive in 11 plays, FB Charlie Cole getting the go-ahead touchdown, and after that the flood gates opened on Davidson.

the University of Toledo since 1949 when he was named Athletic Director. He served in that capacity through 1954, and the following year accepted the business manager position. Then in 1956, the responsibilities of auditor were added.

Francis is a native of Wilkes Barre, Pa., and was graduated from high school in Tiffin, Ohio. He is the only former Otterbein College athlete to win 12 major sport letters in three years. He was named all-Ohio quarterback in 1932 and was all-Ohio forward in basketball in 1932-33. He captained Otterbein football and basketball teams.

Francis came to Toledo from Lancaster, Ohio, High School where he directed athletics and coached the football and basketball teams. He also served as coach and athletic director at Youngstown Struthers, Cleveland Shaker Heights and Columbus Upper Arlington high schools.

PROF TO BE A FOOTBALL COACH, TOO

Not many schools have an academic professor coaching with the football team, but that will be the situation at Toledo this fall when Steve Szabo joins the staff of coach Frank Lauterbur as an unofficial assistant coach while teaching as an adjunct instructor in operations analysis in the College of Business Administration.

Szabo lettered three seasons as a back at the U. S. Naval Academy and then played football with the Quantico Marines, seeing action against Lauterbur's Toledo Rockets in the Glass Bowl in 1965. He has had graduate work at Catholic University in Washington, D. C., and at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, Md.

Dr. Robert Judd, chairman of the department of operations analysis in the College of Business Administration, says Szabo has "an outstanding record of course preparation in operations research at one of the top three or four schools in the country and we are delighted to have him on our staff."

At the same time Dr. Judd said the College of Business's acquisition of Szabo is "a direct 'fallout' from our fine football program. Szabo, Dr. Judd says, "simply wanted to come to Toledo to get some coaching experience under Frank Lauterbur."

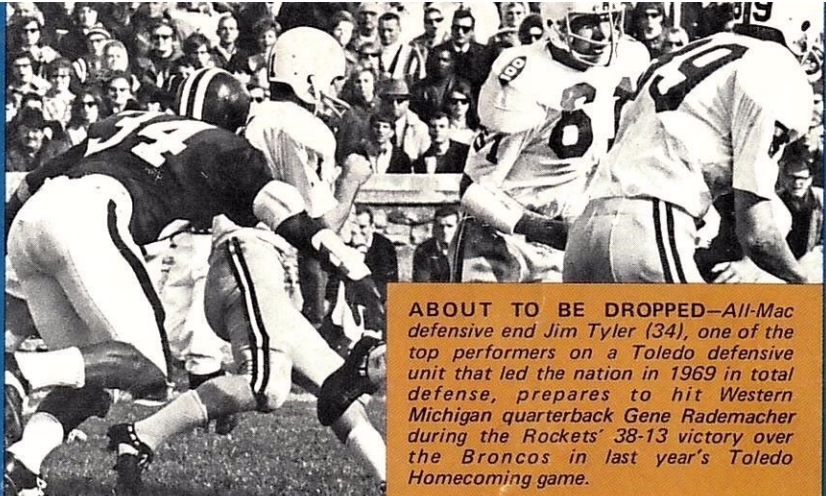

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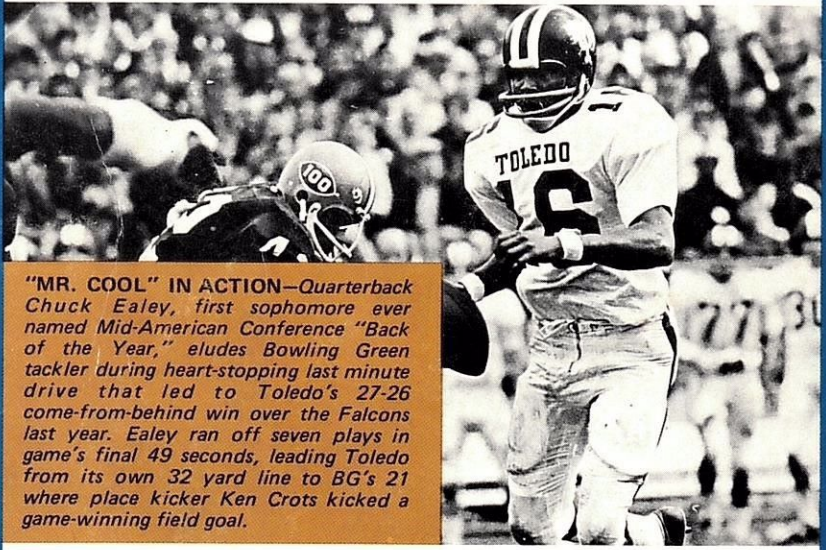

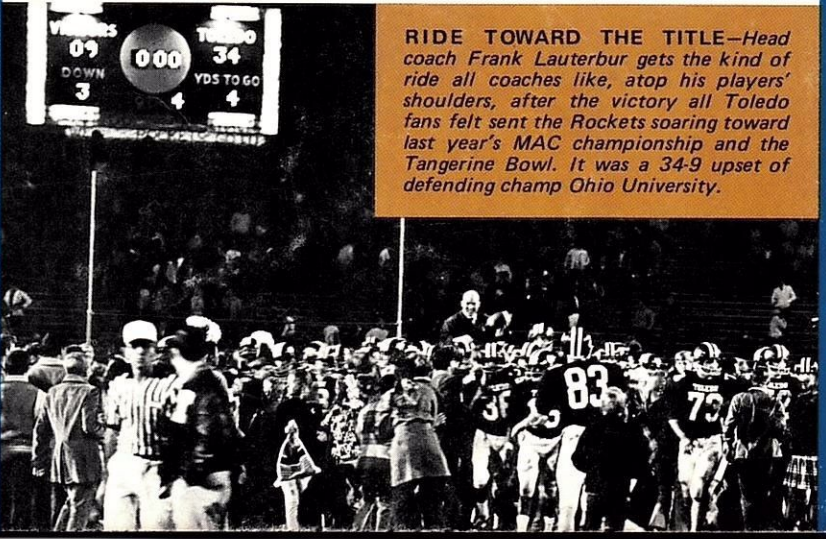
